Dedicated orthopaedic unit will reduce waiting times

We have opened a new dedicated unit for patients having elective orthopaedic surgery as part of a drive to reduce waiting times.

The newly refurbished Ridgeway Elective Orthopaedic Unit, formerly known as Ridgeway Ward, opened in August 2024. The existing ward space has been transformed with new equipment and facilities, including an admissions lounge and therapy suite to help support patients with their recovery.

Funded by NHS England, the £1.4million scheme is the second phase of the wider £14million project that included the creation of the Outpatient Assessment Centre at South Walks House, which opened in February 2024 and offers additional outpatient and diagnostic appointments in Dorchester town centre.




Anita Thomas, Chief Operating Officer at Dorset County Hospital (DCH), said: "This funding has allowed us to transform the former Ridgeway Ward and will make such a difference to people waiting for elective orthopaedic surgery. We will be able to reduce waiting times, treat people more quickly and support their recovery, so they spend less time in hospital."

Nick Savva, Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon at DCH added: "We are very fortunate to have been given the opportunity to develop the Ridgeway Elective Orthopaedic Unit. It has been designed to the highest standards and will facilitate world class levels of care and efficiency."

Our Research Department was established in 2001 and the team includes project managers, nurses, midwives, paramedics, clinical trials assistants, pharmacists and doctors. We also have a small team of volunteer patient research ambassadors who help raise awareness of the various research opportunities available to our patients.



Clinical research is vital for discovering and developing new drugs, technologies and practices in healthcare. It is a key focus within our Trust as we aim to translate research findings into enhanced clinical practices for our patients. Our team is experienced in conducting a wide variety of clinical trials.

We host research funded by organisations including the National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR) and the life science industry. We also encourage hospital-led research and can help assist in the design, setup, and delivery of these projects.

Enabling works underway

Enabling works as part of the construction of our new Emergency Department and Critical Care Unit are underway. Funded by the New Hospital Programme, the scheme will include purpose-built spaces for both major and minor injuries and conditions, a mental health facility, a dedicated emergency paediatrics area, 24 critical care beds, and an ambulance arrivals and fast assessment area. A new rooftop helipad is also being funded by the HELP Appeal charity.
