New patient experience and engagement hub opens

A new patient experience and community involvement hub has opened at Dorset County Hospital (DCH).

The HIVE (Health and Wellbeing, Information, Volunteering and Engagement) will offer a welcoming space for patients and families to provide feedback about their experience, raise any concerns, and be signposted to various support services available in Dorset.

Overseen by the Patient Experience Team, The HIVE will be used to promote hospital initiatives, such as the volunteer service, and by local organisations for drop-in information events. Examples of planned activity include carer support information, armed forces community engagement, Trust Governor surgeries and membership recruitment, NHS Dorset events and Dorset Council digital champion sessions.



The DCH Charity will also be using the space as a 'front-facing door' to the community to promote and encourage fundraising activity.


The HIVE was officially opened by well-known journalist and author Kate Adie.

Kate, who is also the Patron of the DCH Charity's Emergency and Critical Care Appeal, said: "As a passionate supporter of the hospital, I was delighted to be invited to open The HIVE. It's wonderful to see such a fantastic space that will further support patients and their loved ones at times of stress and anxiety."

The hub was funded by the DCH Charity and gave opportunity for the hospital to repurpose the old Friends of DCH shop, located in South Wing, Level 1. It will be open Monday to Friday, 10am to 3pm. Emergency and Critical Care Appeal reaches £1million mark





An incredible £1.1million has now been raised for the Dorset County Hospital Charity's Emergency and Critical Care Appeal.

It is thanks to the fundraising efforts, donations from the local community and businesses, gifts in wills and DCH staff that we have been able to reach this amount.

Money raised will fund enhanced facilities and equipment for the new Emergency Department and Critical Care Unit. Plans include a new child and adolescent mental health suite, dedicated relatives' rooms and a paediatric critical care bed space, a patient garden, artistic designs and equipment.

Spotlight on... Decontamination Services

The team in the Decontamination Department at DCH are responsible for processing all reusable surgical equipment. The service is spilt into two areas, Sterile Services and Endoscopy Decontamination. Equipment is processed by way of washing and disinfecting, inspection and packaging and finally sterilisation. This service is provided for departments within the Trust as well as external practices, such as dentists and GPs, and charities.

All instruments are tracked through the decontamination cycle by a specialist computer system called T-Doc which allows the staff to ensure correct cleaning and sterilisation has taken place. This system also allows trays of instruments to be tracked to each patient and procedure, giving complete traceability.



The role the department holds within the hospital is vital for patient care in ensuring that all re-usable instruments and scopes are processed in accordance with Medical Devices Directive UK MDR 2002 and British Standard ISO 13485.

All staff within Sterile Services are highly trained making sure that these standards are met. The staff also are required to know the names and function of all re-usable medical devices that pass through so that they can check for any imperfections or repairs that might be required.

Major milestone in site construction

This spring marks a major milestone in the construction of our new £100million Emergency Department (ED) and Critical Care Unit. Works to level the site and prepare the ground for main construction are almost complete and have included a new electrical substation, waste compound and access road. This means the next phase of work can begin soon and we will start to see the frame of the new building begin to appear over the coming months.



Accessing our existing Emergency Department



To help keep our emergency services running smoothly during main construction of the new building, people arriving at the current ED on foot or by car now must enter via South Wing, Entrance 1. A dedicated area has been created in South Wing where staff will assess patients and make sure they receive the appropriate care. Ambulances will arrive at the existing ED via the access route that goes around the construction site off Damers Road.

Improved facilities for cancer patients

Work is underway to transform our Fortuneswell Unit for patients undergoing chemotherapy treatment. The £2million refurbishment will include a revised layout with more space, better facilities for patients and staff and an outdoor courtyard space. Chemotherapy outpatients are temporarily receiving their treatment on Fortuneswell Ward while work is underway. The refurbished unit is due to open this summer.
